














Quinceneras leave a forever imprint on girls' lives

>>>A quinceanera is a celebration of a hispanic or latina girl's fifteenth birthday and it can include a church ceremony and a party. "It takes a year to plan a quinceanera, and the process is comparable to that of a wedding. Just as many people come to a quinceanera as to a wedding, and just as much money is spent to have one," said Tanya Guzman (10), who recently celebrated her fifteenth birthday with a quinceanera. Planning a quinceanera is extremely stressful; the party requires months of practice for the dances, dinner rehearsals, and it will be hosted for anywhere from fifty people to three hundred people. "Planning your quinceanera empowers you and it gives you a new sense of responsibility that shows you how much you can do," reflected Karen Lopez (10). There is an abundance of things that goes into preparing for one's quinceanera, from buying a dress, to making sure to maintain a steady weight to fit into that dress. "I had to do a lot of daily exercises to stay fit so that seven months after I ordered my dress, I would still be the same size and I would fit in my dress," said Garcia Guadalupe (10).

A quinceanera represents one's emotional, physical, and spiritual growth. "My quinceanera meant that I was turning into a woman. I wasn't a little girl anymore and realizing that I was a woman made me both terrified and excited," said Ana Perez (10). Though it is optional to have a church ceremony, most girls choose to have one because it makes them feel a deep emotional connection with their God. "The really special thing about having a church ceremony is the priest congratulating you and showing that your religion, and God, has supported you throughout your life," said Guzman.

There are many traditions surrounding quinceaneras, From the traditional dance with a father or godfather,

to the change of shoes ceremony. The father-daughter dance stood out specifically to Celeste Manzo (11) "It was exciting to dance with my dad and it made me feel really good and happy," said Manzo. The change of shoes ceremony is when a girl changes from flat shoes into high heels, representing her change from a girl into a woman. Aside from the more popular and prevalent traditions, many families tend to have their own traditions that they continue at a quinceanera. "Since I was little, my mom always put my face in my birthday cake. So at my quinceaners, she did the same thing. It was hilarious because I didn't expect her to do it, even though it's our tradition, because I had a bunch of makeup and my fancy dress on," said Lopez Another tradition is to hand out fifteen roses to those who you feel have supported you the most throughout your life. I liked to give the roses out because it made me happy to give them to my family," said Alondra Cueves (11). Yet another tradition is to have a book of messages signed by each of your family members at your quinceanera. "The messages people wrote to me in my book showed me all of the support I have from my friends, family, and hispanic community. It's amazing to see all of those positive messages that show you how valued you are and give advice for the future," said Lopez.

The long months, and even years, of planning a quinceanera, the party of a quinceanera, and the religious ceremony a girl may have are extremely enjoyable because of all of the fun that one has when going through the process. "My quinceanera was the best experience I've ever had" said *Guadalupe*. A quinceanera leaves a deep imprint on a girl's life; it is a process that teaches her responsibility and patience and it marks the change from childhood to womanhood. >>>Page by Cassy Moretto











For some, science carried a personal importance. Mariah Gehring (12) chose to major in cell biology after she attended a seminar on diabetes, which directly affected her younger sister.











Although some students took autoshop to learn the basics, others expanded their knowledge to pursue a career in the field. Having grown up in a family of car fanatics **Ashton Souvannavong** (12) knew from a very young age that he would grow up to work on cars.

"Auto Mechanics is a career that I want to pursue and [the class] helped me learn the basics of working on cars," said *Souvannavong*. 














Sonoma County high school students sponsored by the agency, which placed in the topthree.










































