Trio builds contributions by Mike Daniels '59

Throughout its 22-year history, the SRHS Foundation has benefited from the generous donations of its members. One need only look at the list of donors in each newsletter to see who contributes above their membership dues, those who make up the Lifetime Members and the One Thousand Panthers. Those extra funds find their way to the SRHS campus to pay for a myriad of items and programs that Panther students, teachers and staff would not otherwise enjoy.

Yet there are other members who have made and continue to make contributions in a way other than monetary. They regularly contribute their skills, knowledge and equipment to the campus in a very visible manner, to the physical plant itself.

During the current period of drastic budget cutting that jeopardizes campus repairs and upgrades, Dick Colombini, Dave Hunt and Rich Peters have stepped forward to tackle jobs that would not otherwise get done.

All three say their SRHS years prepared them for college and for their careers in construction. And they feel their contributions are a means of "giving back"

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to the school for that preparation.

Among other projects Dick spearheaded to beautify the campus is the sign on Mendocino Avenue. He also installed the lighting for the Ernie Nevers monument, flagpole, the sign on Nevers Field and a number of other projects.

While a student at SRHS, Dick played football for Jimmy Underhill and in his senior year was voted by his teammates to receive the prestigious Block S Blanket Award. He says that Underhill was a demanding coach but that Underhill prepared him for the rigors of college and life. Dick is proud that his close relationship with the legendary coach lasted the rest of Underhill's life. Dick was co-chair of the coach's retirement dinner and presented him as a member of the national College Hall of Fame. "It was a big deal," Dick said.

He also noted long-time teachers Sy Hawkins, Irene Scott, Florence Tangney, Helen Valentine and Mitch Soso were significant influences.

As a student at USF, he played football for Joe Kuharich, another coach of the Underhill school. Dick was on the 7th ranked Dons, who were invited to play in the 1951 Orange Bowl but only if their two African-American players were not on the field. In a bold move for the time, the team boycotted the game and stayed home.

After graduating, Dick spent two years in the US Army in Virginia as a 2nd Lieutenant. Returning to Santa Rosa, he went to work for his father at Colombini Construction, the business he continues to operate today. Over the years, Colombini Construction has built a number of Santa Rosa landmarks, including St. Rose Church addition, Cardinal Newman High School, Comstock Middle School, Union Hotel, Waterfall Towers, WestAmerica Bank, additions to Lawrence Cook Middle School and Santa Rosa Middle School and SRJC's Forsyth Hall.

Dave lived just a block from the SRHS campus but seldom arrived to first period chemistry on time. He remembered that Elmore assigned him a seat by the door so his tardy arrival wouldn't interrupt.

Working part-time after school and in the summers installing sheetrock, Dave remembered earning \$5 a house to haul the scrap away. He also worked at Friedman Bros.

He earned his degree at Pepperdine University where he studied math that he today "uses all the time in construction," like "the Pythagorean Theory to figure angles."

Dave says he's "proud to be asked to work on Foun-

dation projects," and is pleased to witness the "amazing campus changes over the years." And he loves coming to the Foundation Polenta Feed where he always passes the baskets for donations to the gratuity fund that benefits the student servers.

Rich's daughter is a Panther alum and is the third generation of the family to have matriculated from SRHS. All told, seven mem-

bers of the Peters family have SRHS roots.

Rich played Panther football when Larry Anderson was head coach, and he remains proud to have beaten the Vikings his senior year. He also served as Block S president his senior year.

Rich honors the influence of English teacher Eugene DeSoto, science teacher Peter Menth, chemistry teacher Claire Elmore and government teacher Lee Torliatt who, Rich says, "ran a fun class and got off many one-liners."

Early on, Rich understood the need to work in order to achieve what he wanted. After SRHS, he enrolled at Portland State, a "football school," but realized he was not a good fit, so he transferred to Sonoma State and finished his formal

education there.

Somehow, Rich says, he "ended up in masonry." During his working career, he built a number of custom homes and remodeled some with Dave Hunt. Like Dave, Rich has worked on several Project Grad projects and chaperoned many of those graduation nights. He likes giving back to the school for which he has "such good memories."

This trio makes up a source of construction skills both SRHS and the Foundation are very fortunate to rely upon.

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An Alum's eye view of Hollywood by Don Cambou, Class of '64

"All Rights in Perpetuity throughout the Universe." That's the title of an autobiography I'll probably never write about my years in "The Biz." It's also a line found in almost every standard release form used in non-fiction television. If you want to be on our show, you've got to sign it. What do you get in return? Fifteen minutes, or maybe 30 seconds, of fame. Your face and your wisdom will enter millions of homes. So what if you won't get paid for your appearance on Mars 100 years from now? It's a deal most people would happily make.

Television is one of the most powerful forces for good and ill the world has ever seen. I've had the rare fortune to be right in the guts of it for over 30 years. I've worked for most of the major networks, and for many cable networks. For a few of those years, TV took me to the movies, too. I did "Behind the Scenes" features on "Spaceballs," "Willow," "Parenthood," "King Ralph" and many other films.

They say your first day on a movie set is the most exciting day of your life, and that your second day is the most boring. So, a little insider info about some big names. Jane Fonda: serious, total pro. Steve Martin: ditto. Denzel Washington: should have been nicer. George Lucas: shy, good hearted genius. Peter O'Toole: Lawrence of Arabia loves cricket. Mel Brooks: got his way by shouting, but good to his friends. Ron Howard: gets his way by not shouting, nicest guy around

My years doing documentaries were the most rewarding. A highlight was the six-hour documentary miniseries, "The American Revolution." I wrote and produced it for A&E. How many folks get a chance to explore their nation's creation myths and have millions watch the conclusions?

I guess the Big Kahuna was "Modern Marvels," the History Channel's long running tent pole series. As Executive Producer and Show Runner, I creatively guided 450 hour episodes of the technologically heavy anthology show. We explored everything from the "World Trade Center" to "Renewable Energy," from "Milk" to "Wine." Billions of eyeballs have seen this series. I had a staff of about 50, plus freelance writers, producers and editors. I didn't have to worry much about administration, I just had to keep the creative train rolling.

How did I get to that position? I made a couple of short independent films that got some attention. Then I went into the belly of the beast that is L.A. I made cold calls and followed every lead until I found a sympathetic ear at KABC, the largest TV station in the country. Before I knew it, I was doing short stories there. That led to hour

programs as writer, producer, and director. I traveled all over the United States and to many parts of the world, working on fascinating topics.

Sound like fun? Consider this: I'd often land in a new city at midnight, far from my home time zone, get a few hours sleep, then start the new day with a crew I'd never met, in a situation I'd never been in, and interview people (sometimes fussy and famous) I'd never had contact with. That was exciting and often gut wrenching, but the real fun involved writing the program and putting it together. I became good enough to graduate to Supervision and Executive Producer jobs. Did I get rich? Not really.

Because of my modest success, many parents have approached me to ask what courses their kids should take in preparation for film school. I always answer, "Business, with a little law thrown in."

They laugh and say, "No. Really."

"Really," I respond. "And even better, don't send your kid to film school. Give him or her a semester's tuition and go out and make a film or video. Much cheaper. Learn

by doing. Cream rises. The work will test the kid's talent and consuming desire to make it in 'The Biz.' He or she will need both."

My business has changed. The pendulum has shifted far from documentaries to dumbed down so-called "reality." So, in writing this article, I did a mental exercise. I asked myself who of Don Cambou my SRHS teachers would have made a good reality

star. There were many possibilities, but I came upon the answer: chemistry teacher Clair Elmore. I'm sure if you took his class you remember him. He'd regularly create window shattering explosions and other delights. He had once been an industrial chemist. When we messed around with strong acids, he'd tell us the tale of the guy who fell into a vat of acid. After a pause, he'd deliver the punch line, "All they found were his brass buttons." Wow. Now there's a reality TV star!

"Once a Panther, Always a Panther"

A Bit of History Captured

Even the amateur historian sometimes deserves the fluke of good fortune. When Gail Hildebrand Dunning of Trona, a town about 100 miles from Death Valley, e-mailed

us to ask if we had interest in a "nice copy" of a June 1901 *Porcupine* and some other SRHS memorabilia, we jumped at the chance to preserve a little more of the heritage of SRHS.

Copies of the *Porcupine*, a monthly magazine written and student published off-campus and sold to the student body for 10 cents a copy, are few and hard to find. When the SRHS administration created the also monthly *Echo* in 1909, it effectively put its popular competitor out of business. When the *Echo* became a yearbook in 1917, the

Porcupine was long gone. So, Gail's offer intrigued us.

When the package from Trona arrived, It contained the preserved *Porcupine* and a lengthy newspaper article about the '01 graduation ceremony, diploma, photos and other memorabilia of Gail's grandmother, Josephine Conne, a member of the '01 class.

The *Porcupine* contains the schedule of events for the '01 graduation and indicates Gail's grandmother graduated with honors and read the class poem. It also lists the plans of the 27 graduates "after commencement." Josephine

and two other girls said they were "going to learn the culinary art and all those other requisites of the ideal housewife." How the times have changed!

We were curious about

Josephine's post-SRHS life. Did she become the "ideal housewife" or did she have other opportunities?

Granddaughter Gail said that her grandmother was born in Canada in 1880 and lived in various place until she came to Santa Rosa about 1899. She was 20 years old when she graduated from SRHS.

Gail also said, "Josephine and Calvin (Hildebrand) married in Santa Rosa in 1903. My father, Keith Hildebrand, was born in Oakland in 1908... They lived in Oakland and Berkeley for many years... At the end of her life,

Josephine returned to Sonoma County . . . where she died in 1978. She was widowed in 1951.

My grandmother always had an adventuresome spirit and a thirst for knowledge. In 1956, she traveled to Europe with a couple of friends. She was 76 years old at the time. She was a wonderful seamstress and a good cook. During one period of her life, she had quite a collection of African violets, and learned how to propagate them."

And so, another small piece of the SRHS story and its many, many graduates is uncovered and captured.

Foundation goes literary

Scott Gummer graduated from SRHS in 1982, David Vann in 1985 and both became successful writers and authors. On Monday, November 14, they will participate in conversation with Press Democrat columnist Chris Smith in the refurbished SRHS auditorium at 7 pm.

Scott recently published the novel *Parents Behaving Badly*. His non-fiction works include *The Seventh at St. Andrews* and *Homer Kelly's Golfing Machine*. He's edited numerous sports commemorative books, including *Worth the Wait*, the San Francisco Giants official World Series book and has contributed to over 40 magazines.

David is an international bestseller published in 16 languages, the recipient of a dozen prizes, including the Prix Medicis in France and the Premi Llibreter in Spain; author of Legend of a Suicide; Caribou Island; A Mile Down: the True Story of a Disastrous Career at Sea; Last Day on Earth: A Portrait of the NIU School Shooter and contributor to numerous magazines.

In this first such event the Foundation has sponsored, conversation with the author-alums will cover a variety of topics about their craft and their lives. One focus of the evening will provide an opportunity for teachers to enrich their curricula at no cost to them, their students or to their districts. Another aim will encourage the larger SRHS community to visit the campus and participate in a special evening. Foundation members are especially encouraged to attend. Admission is free and refreshments will be provided.

Severe budget cuts and mandated testing have limited opportunities for instructors to provide enrichment for their students. By sponsoring this activity, the Foundation will expand its support of education at SRHS.

Seating is limited, so mark your calendar and come early. Free parking is available in the campus lot on Ridgway Avenue on the south end of the campus. For more information, telephone 571-SRHS. Copies of the authors' latest works will be available for purchase in the auditorium lobby.

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Several Foundation board members were recently able to participate in orientation for incoming SRHS freshmen. It's a wonderful time to meet new families and share in their excitement as they become part of the SRHS family. They will soon learn what it means when we say, "Once a Panther, Always a Panther." Many parents joined the Foundation that evening and expressed their thanks for the work the Foundation does. The board passes that thanks on to you for all your contributions and support.

Ag program grows again

Along with the October release of the 2010 Vintage Panther Chardonnay, the SRHS Agriculture Department can point with pride to its remarkable rebirth. Under the leadership of department chair Lisa Piehl and with the support of the SRHS Ag Boosters, led by its president Bettye Lund '74, the department has overcome the dormant state it was in for a number of years.

Adapting to the changing times, the department offers a number of classes that ag students from the past would not recognize. Earth Science, Ag Biology, Horticulture, Floriculture, Veterinary Science and Viticulture are a few of the new offerings. The Future Farmers of America remains a vital part of the SRHS ag program.

Now staffed with three instructors, the department also has a number of new facilities for its new programs. Built primarily with donated labor and materials and partly funded by the SRHS Foundation, these facilities include a campus green house, the vet-tech laboratory, campus livestock barn and poultry area. Sheep and goats are on the 40-acre SRHS farm, north of Santa Rosa on Alba Lane. The farm also has 30 acres of wetlands, 3 acres of pumpkins and vegetables and 6 acres of chardonnay grapes.

This year's annual open house will occur on October 15 and 16 from 10 am to 4 pm. Pumpkins will be available for purchase and pre-ordered Vintage Panther Chardonnay can be picked up. There'll be lots of games and activities for the kids.

On October 29 at SaraLee Vineyards on Slusser Road, the Ag Boosters, a non-profit 501 (c) (3) organization, will host a Harvest Moon BBQ that will include a casino, wine tasting, no-host bar, tri tip or chicken dinner, live auction, music and dancing. 
