By Rick Blaine Fifty years ago, on June 16, 534 of us graduated in commencement exercises at Bailey Field. It's hard for me to accept so many years have passed because I remember so much about my senior year at that beautiful brick building.

Once he was elected president in 1964, Lyndon Johnson promised many changes in his Great Society platform, but he didn't expect the events in Vietnam. None of us did. After graduation some of us went there to fight and didn't come back. Ronald Reagan was elected governor, and I suspect none of us expected that either. A movie star as governor! We discussed lowering the voting age to 18. I wonder how we would have voted for governor.

An H bomb was lost in the Pacific Ocean that year, and the Beatles played their last concert at Candlestick Park. Civil rights activist James Meredith was shot, the Cold War raged and Walt Disney died. A gallon of gas cost 32 cents, a stamp five cents. The minimum wage was \$1.25 an hour. I made \$1.35 working at Roger's Hamburgers, but I had been there since I was a sophomore. I haven't eaten many hamburgers since. DINNER FOR 650 By Don Cambou '64

The faculty changed then. Bill Larkin, wood shop teacher since the 20s, retired and Raul Diez, a former boxer, took his place. Choral instructor Mr. Barkley and special ed teacher Mrs. Nesalhous both passed away. Mr. Dardis, the boys' dean, resigned, and English teacher Miss Erwin, a 1926 graduate, returned from a year in England.

We were pretty mobile. Many of us had wheels, and each issue of the Santa Rosan ran "The Car of the Week" feature. Two of my favorites were a 1920s Chevy pickup with wooden wheels and a 1956 Chevy hardtop modified to carry surfboards. "The Yellow Dog" had a "sandy" interior.

Cars were important to us. On Friday and Saturday evenings, we'd "tool" around the courthouse (Who knew it'd be torn down soon?), out Fourth Street beyond Foster's Freeze and back downtown. We'd go to the movies at Star-Vue Drive In. We'd drive to the Russian River swim at the beach off Fitch Mountain that had a spillway.

We liked surfing movies and Beach Boys songs, and some of us tried surfing. We guys liked colored Levi's, especially the Slim Fit style we bought at the Brothers 4 above Keegan's. We bought Wrangler "Lean Jeans" for \$6. We liked v-neck sleeveless sweaters and desert boots. We wore Jams away from school because the dress code was strict.

Girls liked granny dresses and granny glasses, and they wore two-piece bathing suits at Morton's Hot Springs. They shopped at the Junior Bootery or Smith's Shoes, Healy's Shoes, Gallenkamp's (more miles in a Gallenkamp), Rosenberg's, the White House, the Village Shop and Deidre in Los Robles Lodge. They had their hair done at House of Charles.

We enjoyed activities like the Car Caravan before the Big Game with Monty. Remember how it rained? And the event was postponed? The Vikings won that game in the mud 19-0 on a Wednesday. We had rallies. One had a pie eating contest. Remember who won? I don't.

The varsity basketball team won the NBL that year, and we won pennants for swimming and track. The seniors played the faculty in a laugh-filled basketball game. I remember the seniors had to play with boxing gloves, at least for a while. The faculty women led cheers for their squad.

We could join clubs: Health Careers, Future Teachers, Key Club, Pep Club, RaRavas, Science Club, and of

course the Block S for athletes. The Ski Club had the most members but it was disbanded because too few wanted to ride a bus to the slopes. Senior Character Day was great fun with senior "mosts." One was the ugliest costume. Another featured a real garbage truck and a crew of garbage men.

Pizza and burgers kept us fed. Roma's Pizza downtown was always crowded. We also went to Shakey's Pizza. We ate burgers from Roger's, Foster's Freeze, The Pickup or High Q. A few guys liked Ingram's Chili Bowl out by Cloverleaf Ranch, and probably everybody ate late night pancakes at Sambo's on College and Mendocino.

The governing board raised money to build a new sign that identified SRHS--a big deal because the Press Democrat ran a photo of it.

I was asked to the Turnabout by a girl I thought I could fall in love with. She bought a red carnation boutonniere for me at Grohe's. It looked nice with my white dinner jacket. We ate pizza at her house with some other couples before the dance. I learned later she was seeing another guy. I heard the Prom at the Flamingo Hotel was a success. I didn't go, not because I was heartbroken, but because I didn't ask soon enough to have the night off from Roger's and because I didn't act soon enough to find a date.

But 1966 was a good senior year for me, and SRHS will always be important to my memories. I sure hope it was good for you.

SRHSF DIRECTOR – UH -- DIRECTS

I think it is important to begin this article with a disclaimer. Here's why: it would be unseemly for Don Cambou to write about himself and his excellent film on the history of Santa Rosa—after all, he is the editor of this newsletter and a Foundation director—I figured I should exercise what little clout I have still as **former** newsletter editor and Foundation director and twist Don's arm to tell the following. Otherwise, you readers might never know about his remarkable accomplishment.

If you've seen the Historical Society of Santa Rosa's film "Santa Rosa: The Chosen Spot...", you know its quality is, in a word, awesome. What you may not know is that historical documentary is the work of the Foundation's Don Cambou, a 1964 Panther.

He worked as the Executive Producer and Show Runner (main creative force) of the History Channel's "Modern Marvels" (12 years, 450 episodes), A&E's "Biography" (30 episodes), writer and producer of A&E's definitive six-hour "American Revolution" and writer, producer and director for a number of cable and broadcast networks—for a total of 37 years. Along the way he earned a number of Emmys and other awards.

So, when the historical society decided to tell the story of Santa Rosa in documentary format, HSSR board member Mike Grace, 1965 Panther and former SRHSF president, approached Cambou about the idea. He agreed it was a good one, created a budget, and Grace went about securing funding. With financing in place, Cambou dusted off his tools and went to work.

"The Chosen Spot..." does relate history, including a nod to SRHS as Santa Rosa's only high school for 84 years, but more importantly it explains and emphasizes how people and the community shaped time, events and place from the area's prehistory to the present day. Cambou hopes the film will motivate people, especially the young, to learn about and appreciate their roots and where they live.

It was released to great acclaim in two public showings in September at the Roxy theatre. If you haven't seen it, information for DVD purchase is available through the HSSR's website www.historicalsocietysantarosa.org.


