The journey to the new Agricultural Facility has been long and sometimes treacherous. For decades Ag students who didn't have space at home could house their livestock on the SRHS campus in the Ammirati Barn. Over time, student projects outgrew that facility, as more town kids began studies in agriculture. Nearly two decades ago, the SRHS Ag department was able to gain use of Alba Lane Farm's old wooden house and barns. The department moved sheep and goats into the barns, while keeping hogs in the Ammirati Barn on campus. In the intervening years, a series of three Ag teachers lived in the old house, providing care and security for the animals. Ag teacher Dawn Stornetta was the last. She was there five years ago when the Tubbs fire swept through the area, burning every wooden structure on the property, but sparing the six acre vineyard. Stornetta was able to escape with only her dog. Fortunately, the October fire came so early in the school year that no farm animals were in the barns.

The SRHS Ag department faced the burned space with determination. Piehl remembers, "For me, this was a passion project. As soon as that place was destroyed, there was no doubt in my mind that we would rebuild." But first, they needed money. Almost two years later, the insurance settlement money came in. During that time, Piehl and her staff applied repeatedly for a California Career Technical Education Grant. On the third funding cycle, they received \$2.2 million in grant funds. The Superintendent of Santa Rosa City Schools at the time, Diann Kitamura, met with Raley's Supermarkets upper management who agreed to a massive donation of \$500 thousand to help fund the project. Another \$250 thousand came from the Alvin Hampton Foundation for the show ring. Hampton was a Petaluma Dairy farmer. Two brass plaques

About the time construction was set to begin, the insidious Covid virus appeared. Construction finally began after Covid's most dangerous wave had passed. Then inflation set in. Since the barn facility is adjacent to the protected wetlands of the Alba Lane Farm, the contractors needed to do significant structural work to shore up the ground, and to add the ability for water to pool away from the barn structure itself. The carefully budgeted project went over budget.

Nevertheless, November 7, 2022 saw the facility's ribbon cutting ceremony. According to Piehl, "We've been fighting for this for five years. It's been hard, but it's finally happened. We're just a month shy of the fifth year anniversary of the Tubbs fire. This barn will exist long after I'm gone. It's huge for me personally, but it's also huge for this program, because we've always prided ourselves on providing our kids a space to experience agriculture so that it doesn't become a lost skill."

December 9, saw the facility's grand opening and a dinner/fundraising event. But there's still work to do – a concrete slab with feed silo needs to be built, there's plumbing to complete, animal feeders to install, and an orchard to replant. The project needs more funds.

was a student, Al Wood was recruited to flip burgers and see to the counter after school and on weekends.

Gable and Lombard had married in 1939, and in 1940 she was filming "They Knew What They Wanted" in the Napa Valley. Gable visited and the pair were frequently seen in the area. Both enjoyed sports and outdoor activities and so, during a break in the production, they decided to go fishing. On their way to maybe the Russian River or perhaps the Eel, they passed through Santa Rosa and, evidently hungry, stopped at the Students' Inn.

What transpired inside the Inn remains unknown, but Al, recognizing them, asked to take their picture. They agreed and stepped outside, Lombard fetching the fishing pole she holds in the photo.

Fast forward to the 1970s. Al's son Scott ('72), a member of Jim Grisham's Panther basketball squad, carried a copy in his wallet. Grisham, seeing the photo, asked about it, and at the end-of-season banquet Al gave him a copy. That's how that photograph came to the campus. It now hangs in the museum.

But what about old cars? I drove a Volkswagen convertible while in college, and in my retirement from SRHS I decided to find another. I did, a '67 model that needed a lot of repairs. I contacted Randy Hansen, my '83 student, about the work while reminding him how I let him out of class to go to the auto shop. Payback time.

Randy's schedule didn't fit with mine, so he directed me to Greg Wood, a specialist in auto restoration. I learned Greg's a '70 alum and his dad was Al Wood, the Gable/Lombard photographer. From that meeting the story of the photograph came into focus.

Greg's interest in autos is as old as he is. His dad drove a restored 1931 Plymouth until he passed away and built quarter midget racers

that Greg drove during their heyday. Today Greg and his son Ed ('96 Panther and fourth generation Wood) operate a small shop where they bring old cars back to their one time glory.

Just another story of how odd pieces tell the SRHS story.

AN ICONIC SANTA ROSA BEER GETS A NEW LIFE

From 1897 to 1966 the Grace Brothers Brewery was a Santa Rosa landmark and major employer. And, if truth be told, their beer was enjoyed by many a SRHS student. How might one of their signature beers be received a half century later? A lot of people wanted to find out.

Josh Grace '79, a member of a four generation SRHS family, had worked closely with Rich Norgrove, CEO of the Bear Republic Brewing Company, to reproduce a classic Grace Brothers Beer – Bavarian Lager. Bear Republic now owns the copyright to the Grace Brother's label. Bear Republic would produce 20 to 25 barrels of the brew, hewing closely to the original recipe. That recipe only existed in the brains of the surviving Graces. Profits would be split 50/50 between the Graces and Bear Republic and ALL profits would go to charity. On the night of September 16, the resurrected Grace Brothers Bavarian Lager debuted at the Bear Republic Brew Pub in Rohnert Park. The large crowd quaffed 7 kegs of the

stuff – and all the canned fourpacks sold out. Many of the surviving Graces were in attendance: Jim '61, Kathy Grace Hayes '63 (Ursuline), John '64, Mike '65, Ben '95, Caitlin 2018 and Conor 2021. Unfortunately Josh, who had done much of the heavy lifting to make the beer a reality, wasn't there. He was home, quarantined with Covid.

The event was a grand reunion of old friends. Mike Grace, one of the SRHS Foundation founders, called it "One of the best nights of my life." The Grace family profits all went to the Santa Rosa Historical Society and the Bear Republic profits went to Ranger Road, a Veterans charity. Capitalizing on their success, there's a rumor that Bear Republic is brewing up another large batch. And about that copyrighted label: Norgrove has offered to sell it back to the Graces – for one dollar.

ONCE A PRANKSTER, ALWAYS A PRANKSTER

Editor's note: Jack Kellar may have been a lifelong Prankster, but he was also a lifelong Panther. He was so devoted to SRHS that shortly after his death in 2006, his daughters Judy '65 and Joanne '67 created a SRHS scholarship in his name: The Lucky Jade Memorial Scholarship. The perpetual scholarship refers to "The Lucky Jade," a high school musical that starred their father Jack.

My dad, Jack J. Kellar SRHS '39, was a prankster, and he loved telling stories of his high school hi-jinx. As a teenager, he stiffed a soda fountain waitress turning toward him for payment by ducking down below the counter, popping up later with a gloating laugh. She was not happy, but can't have been too annoyed, as she married him five years later. One Big Game night, he and a buddy drove around the big bonfire on Fourth Street chauffeuring a few brassiere clad young ladies with their legs sticking out the car windows. They were quite a sight, even though the young ladies were manikins.

Much later, when I was a SRHS student, Dad found a way to involve me in a bit of harmless mischief, too. He must have enjoyed cooking it up, planning what we would do, and waiting for the right time to do it.


From Dad's chair at the kitchen table, he looked out at a great view of the steep, less-buildable hill of the Grace Tract. The south side of the hill was bare except for weeds. One year in the early 1960s, a cross-town high school rivalry between Santa Rosa and Montgomery played out on the hill. Someone had the great idea to use field chalk to create a giant block "S" on the hillside, proclaiming it as Santa Rosa territory and announcing our school pride.

It didn't take long for someone from Montgomery to scuff all the chalk into the dirt and weeds, erasing the "S". Dad must have started thinking then about his plan, but it couldn't be executed just yet. He had to wait months, almost a year.

It had to be in the cool of late winter. And it had to be the night of a full moon. With great excitement he filled me in on his plan. I'm not a prankster by any means. Dad's plan sounded great, though, and I was all for it. Count me in.

Finally the time was right. A full moon in a perfectly clear sky guided our climb through dry weeds and brambles up the side of the hill. It was late, after

bedtime, so we wouldn't be noticed. Once at the right site, we opened our Folger's coffee can and began sprinkling a good measure of grey, granular chemical fertilizer on the ground in the shape of our block "S". Of course, nothing happened. For days and weeks nothing happened. But when the days warmed, and spring rains came, Dad's plan succeeded: our fertilizer

worked its magic on the weeds, sprouting a giant green "S" among the less well-nourished grasses alongside. It would have been tough work for a rival to remove it. That "S" showed our school pride throughout the spring and summer until the hot dry days shriveled the weeds and grasses uniformly to tan, erasing our work naturally.

For a time, though, Dad enjoyed opening the kitchen curtains in the morning and sipping his coffee with a chuckle while admiring his handiwork up on the hill -- the SRHS hill. He still had a good dose of the prankster in him, and school pride, too.



ERNIE NEVERS DID IT ALL!

He was recently added as a charter member of the brand new California High School Football Hall of Fame. The SRHS campus football field is named in his honor. He's a member of the Stanford Athletic Hall of Fame and the

College Football Hall of Fame. He's a charter member of the National Football League Hall of Fame and holds two NFL records—most points scored in a game (40) and the most rushing touchdowns in a game (6). Yet he attended Santa Rosa High for only two semesters. Just who was Ernie Nevers anyway?

Skilled in every sport, Nevers' collegiate and professional accomplishments after SRHS resounded with national significance in the 1920s. The high school wasn't slow to stake out a claim to his fame.

Prior to Nevers, SRHS fielded a woeful football team. In 1919 Coach Victor Hodge's very first team lost every game.

Nevers suited up the next year, and that ignominious record was quickly forgotten. With Nevers as ball carrier, passer, kicker and tackler, SRHS won seven of ten games. Nevers scored 108 of the team's total 170 points, as SRHS won the right to play Berkeley High for the state's northern championship.

Although Berkeley won that game by the lopsided score of 61-0, Nevers was responsible for the growth of high

school football popularity in Northern California.

After football, Nevers went out for basketball. He played in only three games, but his talents continued to impress. The Press Democrat called him a "whirlwind at the forward position" and "one of the best basketball players ever seen in the county." In spite of that abbreviated career, Nevers was named team captain and the California High School Basketball Player of the Year for the 1920-21 season.

The Nevers family moved back to Wisconsin where Nevers continued basketball and baseball play before graduating from Superior Central High School.

The next fall he was back in Santa Rosa at SRJC where he played on the school's first football team.

Sports-minded lawyer Finlaw Geary guided Nevers to Stanford University where his athleticism earned him eleven varsity letters--football, basketball, baseball and track and field. Twice named a football All-American, he scored the single Stanford touchdown in the 1925 Rose Bowl loss to Notre Dame's famed Four Horsemen.

After college, Nevers played baseball with the American League St. Louis Browns. A pitcher, he gave up two home runs to Babe Ruth in 1927, the year the Bambino set the record of 60 round trippers.

In 1926 and 1927 Nevers played for the NFL Duluth Eskimos. Then he played three years for the NFL Chicago Cardinals. But he also played on the semi-pro Santa Rosa Bonecrushers in games on the field named in his honor.

After football Nevers had a brief fling in the movie industry and served in the Marines in WW II. Nevers kept his local contacts, appearing at sports banquets and visiting SRHS football teams. He passed away in 1976.


