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Remember When: 1968 by Rick Blaine

The "Summer of Love" had ended, and the opening of school was delayed a week so we could help with the prune harvest. Did you go out and pick? Maybe the kids who lived on farms did, but I sure didn't, and I didn't go to San Francisco or wear flowers in my hair either. But we all enjoyed the late start to classes.

What was the year like for you? For me, it was lots of fun. I went to all the football games. My girl friend was a cheerleader, so I always yelled as loud as I could. I still see her now and then. She married a lawyer. We beat Monty that year in the Big Game as the rivalry between the two schools became pretty intense. Remember the heavy fog that game? You could hardly see a thing. I remember lots of us going to Shakey's near Coddingtown for pizza after the games. Johnny and Red's on Summerfield was Viking turf, so we didn't go there.

Mr. Vine said school spirit was disappearing, but the rallies always had a good turnout. The Big Game rally and the Car Caravan filled the front of the school. And there was a big turnout to vote for Homecoming Queen. Who won? I don't remember.

But I do remember the Competition Rally before the basketball game with Mont-

gomery. Remember that skit about pirates and Norsemen? One of the pirates was asked about his "buccan-ears." His answer caused him to be suspended for a few days. The administration didn't like his choice of words, good pun that it was. Not good for students to hear they thought, but we'd heard worse and maybe said worse.

Do you remember who sang "Dock of the Bay" at the beginning of the rallies? He was really good, as good as Otis Redding, I thought. Wasn't he voted most talented or something?

The campus was closed, but we could walk off at noon to eat. We had lots of choices. On Mendocino, you could get a burger and fries at Sandy's or Roger's. For 15 cents you could buy a Poor Boy sandwich at the Poor House across from SRJC. Out in Montgomery Village, there was the High Q and the Pick-Up (open until 2 in the morning on weekends). Sambo's and Foster's Freeze and Eat 'n Run were popular, and lots of the girls who shopped downtown on Saturday liked to go to Mac's Deli.

We did a lot of driving, especially on Friday and Saturday nights. Did we call it "cruising" or was it "tooling?" Of course, gasoline was cheap then, about 30 cents a gallon. Remember scraping together a dollar or so in coins from everyone in the car? That dollar bought enough gas to drive up and down Fourth Street and around the courthouse until it was time to go home.

In 1968 you could buy a '67 Pontiac GTO with a floor shift for \$3000 from Ralph Vesper Used Cars. For the same \$3000 you could buy a '62 Corvette from Veale Volkswagen's used lot. If you had \$2000, a '61 Porsche could be yours from Bishop-Hansel Ford. Who could afford those prices then? Think what those cars are worth today. In 1968, we'd probably settle for the '60 Rambler American two-door for \$395 at Zumwalt's—and made payments.

We dressed well. Guys wore sweaters, cardigans or v-neck pullovers and sometimes neckties. We bought our clothes at Brothers Four or Rosenberg's or Archie Kash. Levi's, we always found at Paolini's on Wilson Street.

Kudos to cochairs Jacky Cooper Schalich and JoAnn Hembree MacDonald and their committee for making this a special night. During May, Rosie Clarke London, with the help of her committee of Foundation Board members, organized our annual Student of the Month recognition dinner. Nearly 60 students were acknowledged for their achievements in front of their families and recommending teachers—truly our best "feel good" program of each year. Thanks, Rosie for your efforts.

Another acknowledgment I would like to make is to our tireless treasurer, Jim Ward. Jim not only assists the Board in managing the Foundation's budget and providing accurate and helpful financial statements, he also serves on various committees and is always there when someone needs a last-minute check for a vendor. Jim's work, in conjunction with our Financial Oversight committee, is critical to the financial strength of the Foundation, and we value his skills and dedication.

On a final note, please mark your calendars for our 13th Annual Foundation Golf Tournament on September 12th and our "Big Event" on October 11th that will also mark our 20th anniversary. The girls shopped for clothes at the Fashion downtown or at the Village Shop or Lewis in the Village. Of course, Coddingtown had big name stores like Roos-Atkins, the Emporium and Joseph Magnin.

Lots of girls, including my steady, made most of their clothes,

even prom dresses. They found the material at places like Doyel's or the Fabritique or the Yardage Shop.

We did have a dress code. The girls said Mrs. Parker walked around with a ruler and if she suspected the dress was too short she made use of that marker. Some girls were sent home to change. That happened to my girl. She wore this paisley dress that she made. Boy, was she humiliated. Funny how you can remember some things. The Santa Rosan asked about dress length, "Where is the point of distraction? Four inches below

the knee?" The administration never answered that question.

Guys could wear t-shirts, but they had to have a pocket! Did you sew one on your shirt?

And hair styles! Girls liked to pile it up in what they called "ratting." And they wore wiglets or the pastiche when they had their hair done at places like House of Charles or Clara's House of Beauty for the big dances.

Great dances that year had great atten-

dance. It started with the Welcome Dance. That must have been city-wide because I remember Ursuline and Cardinal Newman were there. Ursuline was a really old school, but Newman was not.

Do you remember the Christmas Dance? The "Third Foundation" played, all guitars and keyboard. We rocked! That dance was sponsored by the Girls' League. I never knew what they did, but they put on a good party. The Turnabout was fun too. We guys appreciated being treated by our girls. Did you go out to dinner? We did. To the Hilltopper.

Did you go to the concerts at the Fairgrounds or the Vets? I went to hear the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band. The place was packed! Moby Grape played there too.

Did you watch much television? You could choose from 12 channels if your family subscribed to Total Television. I never missed "Laugh In" on Sunday evenings or Dean Martin. He was so cool!

Senior Character Day was a good time. I wonder how all the "senior mosts" turned out, don't you? Did they live up to their labels? Mr. Vine, the senior class advisor, dressed up. He acted out a lot in class I remember.

We had some great teachers, including Mr. Greenberg and Mr. Elmore. I had Mr. DeSoto for English. He scared me

when he stood on the desk and recited some poem or other, but I learned to like and respect him. I think of him often whenever I write today because I know I am using what he taught me. Mr. Brown taught a cooking class for guys. I didn't take it, but I thought about it. I wonder if today I would use what that class taught.

The Viet Nam situation was big news though I don't think we paid much attention. I remember Mr. O'Neill telling us that we ought to find out because it could affect us all, especially us guys. I know that I

thought a lot about college and studied pretty hard that senior year because I knew that good grades in college could keep me out of the war.

Were we apathetic? Or just naïve? I only know that our world was pretty small in 1968 and life was pretty simple. Drugs were not the issue they are today, yet we drank beer and harder stuff sometimes. Santa Rosa was still pretty small. Mendocino Avenue was still called "Business Route 101" even though the freeway had been elevated just a couple of years before. We were seniors just at the beginning of some radical changes in the larger world.

Do you remember how the assassination of Martin Luther King quieted the campus in the spring? How saddened we were when Bobby Kennedy was shot dead the week before graduation? Those were sobering moments. After our graduation, anti-war protests would heat up, Olympic athletes would give the "Black Power" salute, the first moon landing would happen, there would be violence at the Democratic Convention, and there would be big problems at Woodstock and Altamont.

The end came for some teachers who decided to retire that June. Mrs. Parker was one. Mr. Jamison and Miss Erwin, who had both graduated from SRHS in 1925, and Mrs. Gross, the very popular school nurse, would not return in the fall. Mr. Vine, that colorful man, retired from coaching, and Mr. Hodder left to teach at SRJC.

And 422 of us also would not come back in the fall. We graduated from Bailey Field on June 14, and about half of us went to San Francisco for an all-night cruise on the bay.

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Was 1968 fun for you? I hope so. It sure was for me.

Teacher wins Jack London Award By Mary Main Testorelli '47

Ron Reichmuth, SRHS special education teacher, recently won the prestigious Jack London Award, given each year by Sonoma State University to an instructor who has displayed extra-ordinarily innovative methods of teaching. Before making their selection, this year's team of evaluators toured campuses and interviewed students and teachers at the 21 schools in Northern California where the candidates for the award teach.

Reichmuth's innovative approaches cluster under his umbrella School to Work – Special Day Program. They include the Barkery Bakery, doggy treats that the students bake, package and sell; the Pop-It-Up, a popcorn concession; the Panther Café, deli sandwiches, Italian sodas and smoothies for teachers, all of which the students make and deliver; and Recycle This!, a recycling service the entire campus uses. The SRHS Foundation is proud to have provided the seed money for many of these valuable educational programs, but all of them are Reichmuth's creations.

Students participate in each project from the beginning, by naming, designing logos, creating weekly work schedules, using the cash register, counting change and doing the banking. Reichmuth's 32 students pride themselves on their abilities to use public transportation to conduct business and on their high level of respect for each other and for their projects. A DVD the students made to explain their program was showcased by Jim Helmer, SRHS Art Quest instructor, and reviewed by Sonoma State University staff.

Reichmuth, who entered college at age 46 after 27 years in the retail business, has taught for just ten years, but in that time he has made a significant impact on the lives of his students, who are as dedicated to him as he is to them. Together they raised \$1,000 in pledges when Reichmuth ran for 6 days in an arduous race from Goleta to Mexico, an event supporting breast cancer survivors and special education. This year, through their programs and dedicated effort, Reichmuth and his students have earned money for a bus trip to the Monterey Aquarium.

Ron Reichmuth's inventive and innovative programs and projects, and his passion and his energy, have earned him the right to the Jack London Award, a most significant honor in education.





We are Friends—Still! by Pandy

Ed. Note: Because Pandy is a shameless promoter of all things SRHS, he was impressed by the staying power of this relationship, and he hopes you will share the story of your own friendship. Heck, we'll even send him to interview you if you like. You can access the poem discussed below at www.srhsf.org Click on "History."

Pandy has been around the SRHS campus since 1955, and in that time he has watched thousands of friendships blossom and develop. Perhaps one of the most enduring and endearing is the story of two 1985 grads, Hillary Wootton and Jenny Treadway, who together broke with tradition and composed a long and saucy poem for delivery at graduation. The opening lines certainly establish the tone:

"These are the best years of your lives,"
Say the parents of 1985.
That what they tell us high school should be,
But was it really that way for you and for me?

But the poem was never delivered because a more conventional piece was decided upon by the panel of faculty judges. Hillary, though, "still believe(s) that poem would've knocked 'em dead."

The graduation ceremony, that bastion of formal tradition and ceremony, has in the years since, lost some pomp in favor of more informality. But in 1985, tradition still ruled.

Hillary and Jenny met in dance class as sophomores and had many classes together. "We used to spend a lot of time driving around, doing errands," noted Hillary. "I don't know why two high school girls needed to run so many errands, but it seems we did an awful lot of them."

As their senior year ended, circumstance caused a break in SRHS graduation tradition.

Since the early 1950s, commencement had taken place at Bailey Field on the SRJC campus, but in 1985 the board of education decided all high schools—SRHS, Montgomery and Piner—would graduate their seniors on the same night and Montgomery would use Bailey Field.

Ultimately, SRHS went to the county fairgrounds, partly through fears that problems could arise because of nearness should SRHS use Nevers Field. The fairgrounds was a hard sell to seniors and parents, but that break in tradition also made appropriate the attempt to write the poem.

Jenny was invited to join the competition to speak but didn't know what to say. One afternoon, as Jenny remembers, the two girls were "goofing around," and the poem "came together... the rhymes came together very quickly and gave me the push I needed. I wasn't seriously considering an entry."

Working on delivery with speech teacher Jim Dunwoody, Jenny gained confidence and felt her chances were strong. So, naturally, when the formal composition was chosen instead, she was crushed. But life continued and so did the friendship.

Jenny went to Cal Poly, where she earned her degree in math, then to Dartmouth and Portland State for graduate study. She lived in Minneapolis for years, married and moved to Salt Lake City, where she now works as a software engineer. She has a two-year-old daughter and recently gave birth to a son.


Hillary was more of a vagabond: studied at San Diego State, a nanny in London, BA in English at UC Davis, taught at Vintage High in Napa, ESL in Berlin, taught at Petaluma High, trained teachers with the Peace Corps in the Philippines, more ESL in London, and taught at a junior high in Seattle. Today, she lives in Seattle with her two dogs and works in contract sales of office furniture.

Over the years, the relationship strengthened. Jenny believes it did so because of letters Hillary wrote her the summer she spent in Italy. She also says remaining friends with Hillary gave her "an excuse to go to places - like the Philippines - and a place to stay - like in London."

Hillary expanded on that belief when she said, "In the days before e-mail and cell phones, keeping in touch took more effort. The fact that both of us love getting a real letter in the mail was a huge factor in our long friendship."

Heartwarming stories like this indicate the important place of SRHS in the lives of young people as it provides an opportunity for lives to come together and for a strong, lasting relationship to result.

The 2008 Homecoming Game is on October 24th. Wouldn't it be fun to have a contingent of SRHS Alums at the game?



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
