## Girls' sports: then and now by Mike Daniels '59

When the campus building known today as the North Gym opened in 1929, its athletic use was intended only for boys. The girls had no such facility, but they weren't expected to have an interest in exercise and athletics anyway. It would take over 40 years before the playing field would begin to level for both sexes. Big shifts in attitude and understanding first needed to evolve.

Mildred Turner joined the SRHS faculty in 1923 as the first physical education teacher for girls in the history of the school. A 1914 graduate, Turner would enjoy a lengthy career of 39 years, finally retiring in 1958. During that time, her teaching centered on dance as until 1930 that was the only activity for girls.

There are reasons for that. First, in the patriarchal society of the time, it was a common belief that intense physical activity such as running would irreparably damage female reproductive organs. As a result, girls were limited to more demure physical activities. Posture was also an important part of female physical development. Until the 1920s the female body

often found itself in a corset so that correct posture could be maintained. For years at SRHS a contest was held to determine which girl had the "best" posture. Exercises for "general beautification" were conducted that addressed posture and the "bad effects of

small shoes and stockings."

In 1930 gym facilities for girls were added to the music building, but they paled in comparison to the boys' gym. Just showers and a small locker room were attached to the dance floor.

Also that year, Frances McCanse Ballou, a 1923 alumna, became the second SRHS girls' physical education instructor. Because of her interest in physical activity (She had played golf and other sports.), she expanded the possibilities for girls interested in sports and competition. She introduced a number of games and activities and developed "Play Day" contests with other high schools so that girls could experience competition.

Ballou organized the Girls' Athletic Association (GAA), and the organization fostered the development of many athletic options for girls. Its stated purpose, in the ambiguous language of the time, was "to arouse greater athletic sportsmanship and school spirit among the girls." That first year, 211 girls joined GAA—a sizeable number considering a total student enrollment of less than 1,000.

Ballou organized the first SRHS Play Day in the spring of 1931 and hosted high schools in Geyserville, Petaluma, Sebastopol and Healdsburg. Because of the lack of space and facility, games and activity spilled onto the neighboring SRJC campus.

Over the years GAA and Play Days would grow in size and activities to include Bay Area schools. Competition also expanded to include such activities as swimming, running, tennis, field hockey, volleyball, basketball and many others. In 1937, girls were even introduced to the fundamentals of football.

Block SR grew out of GAA to become the counterpart to the boys' Block S Club. Girls earned points through competition and activity as did the boys, and they became as common a campus sight in their white sweaters as the boys in their black ones.

While the induction ceremony into Block SR was far less severe than into Block S, at times it went to lengths to humble the inductee. In 1945, for example, continued on page 3

in the gym after classes (which now had equal shower and locker facilities for both sexes) initiates were fed a "substance of onions, whites of eggs, pickles, mustard, chocolate and pepper." They were blindfolded, led through an obstacle course, then taken to the senior steps to wash

them with a toothbrush. They had arrived at school wearing a man's shirt, a tie, socks and garters, and carrying a pan as a purse.

After the ceremony, the GAA members went to the

cafeteria for cake or to Doyle Park for a picnic. The boys, on the other hand, enjoyed a BBQ at the river or dinner at a restaurant, often with featured speakers and a number of guests from the community.

The girls may have had equal showers and similar initiations, but other facilities remained lacking. In 1948 Ballou and Ernestine Smith created the new sport of

"shovel and rakeball" to prepare the field between the main building and Burke Hall for grass in order to prevent injuries during play.

In the late 40s limited co-ed games came about. In one basketball game before 700 spectators crammed into the gym, the Pretty Boys beat the All-Star Girls 18-12. In coed noon time baseball games, the girls' teams had male pitchers and catchers and the boys had females.

Physical education continued in this fashion until the late 60s when campus unrest spread throughout the country. While involvement in sports for both boys and girls continued, interest in the social organizations supporting sports did not. Participation in GAA and Block S declined

as students pointed outraged fingers at what they saw as outdated and irrelevant. Many other traditional campus organizations and clubs disappeared as new ones—ethnically, politically and physically oriented—supplanted them.

But by1971 not much had really changed for girls in sports. Brenda Pagliari, just out of college, arrived on the SRHS campus ready to make changes. She found herself thwarted at every turn. Girls were not allowed to play in the new gym on the south part of the campus. Softball was played between the main and ag buildings and the girls had to mow the grass themselves. They had one uniform for volleyball, basketball and softball. They held bake

sales to raise money to pay for officials. Many times they had to clean the North Gym if boys had used it for a basketball game. Boys didn't suffer any of these indignaties. President Nixon signed Title IX into law in 1972. This legislation mandated that funding for educational and athletic opportunities for the sexes be equalized in the school system. Title IX led to a huge expansion in athletic opportunities for girls at SRHS and proved that sports participation is an important part of curricula and personal growth. It became clear that high school students

who play sports—girls and boys--also achieve in the classroom.

Pagliari noted that in 1976 the girls were finally allowed to play and practice in the South Gym and if there was a boys' tennis team, for example, there must be one for girls. Also, money soon became available for uniforms, officials and buses. Girls teams became a part of the North Bay League and games were scheduled with the other high schools in the league.

The harbinger of change was made obvious when in 1974 Maridee Noonan, Dana Belden and Jill Maridee Lightfoot earned a Block S by swimming on the boys' team and reinforced in 1978 when Teresa

Pellegrini earned her block on the boys' soccer team and was elected president of the Block S Society.

Attitudes toward girls in sports and understanding of their abilities have indeed come a long way at SRHS . . . and a long way toward leveling the playing field.

### **History**

Ed. Note: Two years ago, SRHS social science instructor Dave Franzman created a club for student history buffs. It's since quickly established itself as a major player among campus organizations by some major coups. Among these, in History Day competition, the club scored a first place at the county level with a presentation about women's suffrage and followed that with another first place at the state level, winning against 900 other high schools. In June they took their entry, "Revolution, Reaction, Reform," to Washington, DC to compete at the national level. The Foundation was pleased to assist in funding for the trip.

The SRHS team and I had a great learning experience in Washington. The experience was certainly worth the price of admission. I learned a great deal, not the least of which is how to get nine young people across the country and not lose any one of them.

Including teachers, parents and chaperones, around 7,000 people were involved in the national level competition, 2,800 of them students. We competed against 100 exhibits, and while we didn't finish in the top three, we did receive excellent comments from the judges. To touch up the exhibit, the kids added some content that turned out to be a wrong move as the addition exceeded the 500-word limit—serious flaw!

Our accommodations were at the University of Maryland, a school founded in 1807, 67 years before SRHS. Call it beginners' luck, but our dorm with two occupants per room enjoyed air conditioning. Most of the dorms did not have that luxury. In fact, I learned it was the first time since 1996 that California teams enjoyed cool dorm evenings.

Each day the students and I traveled 45 minutes by Metro to DC. One day we were fortunate to be guided on a fantastic tour of the capitol by SRHS alum Jimmie Fremgen '04, who is working as an intern for Senator Robert Hargen of Ohio. We appreciated the fact he took the time to get us into places not normally available to tourists.

We also took in the Holocaust Museum, which definitely affected us all, and we visited many of the memorials, including World War II and the Lincoln Memorial. The most touching was the Vietnam Memorial. One of my students lost a family member in the early part of that conflict. Most poignant, though, was the parent accompanying us who, when she was a high school student, wore a wrist band with a soldier's name on it. Wrist bands were given to students in the 70s in support of the soldiers in the field. The parent did not know what happened to her wrist band

soldier until our visit to the memorial. It was a powerful moment for us all.

The week peaked for us when our exhibit was chosen to represent California at the National Museum of American History where we answered questions asked by the history fans visiting the museum. Our entry was placed in the Kenneth E. Behring Center of the museum, and the kids were honored to have Mr. Behring himself come by and talk about the exhibit. Mr. Behring is one of the biggest sponsors of National History Day.

I am proud of the students, their accomplishments and their role as representatives of SRHS, Sonoma County and California.





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
