Teachers go to war by Steve Hart '68

World War II changed Santa Rosa High School, just as it changed Sonoma County.

Teachers left their classrooms for the battlefields in Europe and the Pacific. SRHS joined the war effort, offering first aid training for students and adults. Wood shop students built boxes for emergency supplies and the school auto shop held car repair classes for women whose husbands had gone off to fight.

Students began learning about aviation, meteorology and radio communications.

Santa Rosa was a busy military flight training center during the war, with an Army airfield north of town (now Charles M. Schulz-Sonoma County Airport) and two Navy airfields in Santa Rosa and Cotati.

Several teachers who served in the Army, Navy and Merchant Marine returned to their classrooms after the war, along with a group of war veterans who joined the faculty after 1945. This group made lasting contributions to SRHS and the community.

They included long-time principal Fred Duey, who

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taught Navy aviators in Texas before becoming the SRHS top administrator in 1946. He served as principal until 1970. James King joined the agriculture program in the fall of '46 after three years fighting in France and Germany. He taught at the

high school for 33 years and built an ag program of statewide prominence.

Librarian David Crockett, science teacher James Dardis and English teacher Andy Wallstrum also served before joining the faculty.

Mitchell Soso, hired in 1942 to teach English, history and math, returned to the classroom in 1946 after four years in the Army, including two years in occupied Japan. He later became Santa Rosa's superintendent of schools.

Vets returning to the faculty included social science teacher Dave Condit, math teacher Robert Newton and physical education instructor Lyle Reynolds, who saw action in the North Pacific at the invasion of Kiska and Attu.

William Barclay was an Army sergeant who was wounded at the Battle of the Bulge. He was SRHS choral director from 1952-65.

Women faculty did their part. Girls dean Grace Rothert taught chemistry for the Army. French teacher Ruth Parle wrote propaganda for the U.S. Treasury during the war, and history teacher Elizabeth Hunter joined the faculty after working as a typist for the Navy at Mare Island.

Perhaps the most decorated World War II vet on the SRHS faculty was Douglas Campbell, hired in 1948 to teach English, civics and journalism. He was awarded the Silver Star, one of the nation's highest honors for valor in combat.


Campbell grew up in Vallejo and was studying at U.C. Berkeley when the U.S. entered World War II. A member of ROTC at Cal, he soon enlisted in the Army and was sent to officer training school in England. Campbell volunteered for the Army Rangers, an elite unit that saw fierce fighting in Europe and the Pacific.

He was a first lieutenant when he landed in France shortly after D-Day in mid-1944. He took part in the battle for Brest, a French seaport that had been heavily fortified by the Germans. The Allies badly needed to capture the port on Brittany's *Continued on page 3*

Happy New Year from the SRHS Foundation! This coming year will offer activities that will make you proud to be a member.

Interest in this annual event is increasing to the point it will be held in the evening in order to seat student and community spectators.

Because of inquiries I've received, I'd like to offer explanation of the structure of the Foundation. It was formed 25 years ago as a 501 c (3) non-profit organization and is chartered with the State of California. The mission of the Foundation is to preserve and document the history and traditions of SRHS, to provide financial support for SRHS and its programs and to promote community involvement in SRHS activities.

The volunteer and unpaid board of directors currently has 23 members with two open seats. The directors operate 12 committees that meet on a regular basis to maintain Foundation operation and its activities.

The board is excited to welcome its newest members, Dan Bribiescas and Sylvia Strong. Dan graduated in 1987, coached the soccer team for years and his daughter is currently a SRHS student. Sylvia graduated in 1962 and is a retired escrow officer Both bring enthusiasm and needed skills to the board.

coast so it could be used to land supplies for their invading troops.

Rangers and members of three infantry divisions met intense resistance from German paratroopers and other enemy soldiers dug into fortifications in the city. The Allies suffered 4,000 casualties in house-to-house combat and artillery barrages during the two-month campaign.

The Germans surrendered the port in September, 1944, and the Allies took 38,000 German prisoners.

Six months later, Campbell was fighting in Germany in Gen. George Patton's invasion force when he was severely wounded. He spent the next 14 months in Army hospitals.

He later recalled an encounter with Patton. The general, known for his salty speech, was visiting wounded soldiers in a field hospital when he came to Campbell's cot. An aide recited the official report of Campbell's actions in Brittany, for which he'd received the Silver Star.

"Why, you are a goddamn fightin' son-of-a-bitch!" Patton exclaimed.

After the war, Campbell returned to California and finished his studies at Berkeley. He was hired at SRHS and taught there until 1958, when he became chairman of the English department at newly-opened Montgomery High.

Campbell hardly fit the image of a war hero. Mildmannered and scholarly, he was known for his dry wit. He was also a stickler for correct English.

Campbell left teaching in 1963 to become a school district administrator. He was director of Santa Rosa secondary education when he retired in 1981.

He enjoyed a lengthy second career as a copy

editor and reporter at *The Press Democrat*. Campbell started at the paper in 1949, working on Saturdays and during summer breaks. He also wrote columns and book reviews for the newspaper.

As a Ford Foundation fellow and faculty advisor to the SRHS newspaper, *The Santa Rosan*, he visited newspapers across the country, including *The New York Times* and *Washington Post*, to study news-gathering methods. Campbell continued on *The Press Democrat* copy desk until 1987, and was considered the paper's resident expert in English grammar and usage.

Campbell didn't talk much about his war experiences, said his daughter, Caitlin Campbell Woodbury (SRHS '72). "To us, he was just Dad," she said. "But I think it shaped him as a person."

The family visited France after he retired and saw the Normandy beach where he'd landed after D-Day.

Campbell was at first reluctant to leave their car and walk to the overlook. When he did, he watched waves rolling onto a peaceful, empty beach. "That's not what it looked like the day I was here," he said.

Campbell died last April at age 90.

The house was purchased by my parents, Dr. and Mrs. Martin Hutchinson, in the 1950s or 60s. It was sold around 2009.

The front door of the house is now in the Church of One Tree in Santa Rosa, the Ripley museum. Tom Farrell told me that at a Rotary Club meeting. Tom wanted a record of this fact.

Recently, SRHS English teachers Will Lyon and Jessica Dennis approached the Panther Project Fund to finance a campus poetry contest, called a "Poetry Slam."

The committee saw the contest as a way to involve the on-and-off campus community and suggested the teachers allow the Foundation to sponsor the event as it did with last fall's Author's Night.

Both teachers eagerly accepted the offer, and with increased funding they set about planning a larger event than originally conceived.

Scheduled for Thursday January 31, from 7-9 pm, the "Slam," held in conjunction with the national organization Poetry Out Loud, will feature up to 40 young SRHS poets competing for the opportunity to advance to the county level and then state and national. The national winner will receive a \$20,000 scholarship, and the top nine will earn cash prizes.

The SRHS contest will feature live music and guest poet Christina Perez, who will help with judging, as will the Press Democrat's Chris Smith and Kerry Benefield '91 along with two SRHS faculty. Admission is free and the Foundation membership and the SRHS community are especially urged to attend to help support the young SRHS poets.

Campions march again

The Campions, the local five-time national champion precision drill team, will again be featured in this year's Rose Parade. But, instead of performing, this time they'll be grand marshals of Santa Rosa's popular annual event.

They're a bit grayer and older now, and the last time they were in the Rose Parade was 1987. That was when 25 of the team reunited, rehearsed to perfection and twice strutted though the route to the acclaim of many parade goers who had never seen them in their glory days.

They marched to honor Ralph Wareham, their long-time drillmaster who was grand marshal that year.

The Campions were an outgrowth of the local Boys' Club, organized in 1944 by Tom Campion, a constable in the sheriff's office.

Marching and practicing helped give the boys the "something constructive" that Campion envisioned. They appeared in parades in the mid-40s as a "junior boys marching team."

When the boys grew too old for the club, many of them did not want to stop marching so a squad was established for them. In 1949 these older guys won first place in a parade in Healdsburg.

Wareham became drillmaster in 1950, and in 1956 team members voted to call themselves "Campions," after the Boys' Club founder.

The Campions, every one of the first generation team a SRHS student, won five national championships and 13 state titles before their steps ended in 1965.

The '57 team, the first national champion, perhaps garnered the most publicity, even at the national level. The competition for that champi-

Henry and Doris Matteri Agricultural Scholarship Established

Denise Matteri-Roberts '70 and Deborah Matteri '74 recently contacted the Foundation to accomplish the wish of their father and mother that, when the final one had passed on, to establish a scholarship at SRHS in their names. The scholarship will be known as the "Henry and Doris Matteri Agricultural Scholarship Fund." An initial \$25,000 has

been delivered to the Foundation and earnings of the fund will annually be awarded to deserving graduating agriculture students.

The criteria for selecting students is their enrollment in an agriculture program at Santa Rosa Junior College after graduation from SRHS. Scholastic standing is not necessarily a requirement, rather, a promising and committed pathway to an agricultural- related career and the student's financial need are more highly considered. Each year, two students will be selected by the agriculture department and the Matteri family will be notified.

The Matteris operated a dairy on the outskirts of Santa Rosa and for four decades farmed the land. At a young age, Henry had a love for dairy farming and picked prunes so that he could purchase his first Jersey bull. Henry graduated from SRHS in 1951 and won top honors as an FFA member. He married his high school sweetheart, Doris Ferrari, Class of 1950, a marriage that lasted until her death in 2004. The couple ran the ranch as a team with a herd of 350 milking cows, numerous heifers and calves with the milk sold to Safeway. In 1978, they were honored as the Sonoma County Fair's "Dairy Family of the Year." Their ranch was subsequently sold in 1988. Both served simultaneously on the board of directors for the Sonoma County Farm Bureau, a group that honored Henry in 2000 as the "Agriculturalist of the Year"

Both Denise and Deborah appreciate the work of the Foundation to fulfill their parent's desires for generations to come while encouraging students to pursue agricultural-related studies and careers.

known as the Fourth Street School). named in honor of


the "Pathfinder of the West," opened in 1874 on Fourth before the school moved to College Avenue and then to Hum-


